The mighty Komatsu 930E dump trucks travelled from Arizona, to Houston anf then to Africa

ccess Freight Projects has been working on another technical shipment for a Brazilian third party mining contractor.

This particular shipment originated in Arizona, US and was shipped via Houston. It comprised four dismantled refurbished Komatsu 930E mining

Even disassembled, individual pieces are very large - the highest being the canopies standing at an impressive 4.58 meters high, and the heaviest being the chassis up to 53 metric tons each. Just these four trucks comprised 451 metric tons and 3302 cubic meters of freight.

The Komatsu 930E was the first Ultra Class off -highway hauler built and introduced in May 1995 at a rated payload capacity of 310 tons. In 1996 it was upgraded to 320 tons with the addition of larger tyres through the 930-2 and 930-3 models. The Komatsu 930E is notable for being one of the larg-

est models of trucks ever manufactured. Prior to 2005, it was the largest in the world.

These trucks are en route to the U&M Mine in Chingola, Zambia where they will be reassembled and put to work on the open pit copper mine.

The company, based in Johannesburg, South Africa recently moved into two new state-of-the-art warehouses with an overall capacity of 10,000 square meters. www.gpin.net

Capital

YNL's record load through Jiangsu



PLN member Younger Niche Logistics (YNL) has the distinction of being responsible for the movement of the single largest piece of equipment ever moved by road transport in Zhangjiagang, Jiangsu province, China. The piece, 14 meters by 7.4 meters by 7.9meters, and weighing 86,000 kilograms, was moved by road from the supplier's premises to Puxiang port, Zhangjiagang.

The move, covering 30 kilometers, took 22 hours to complete and involved the services of local Zhangjiagang government, the police and officials from the department of electrical power.

In order to reduce height the unit was transported minus cradles. Only once alongside the vessel was the unit positioned and secured in cradles.

Puxiang port, a privately owned facility, was chosen as the load port as access from suppliers whilst still difficult was the closest with less overhead obstructions than other roadways to the public port. www.gpln.net

Remote — but Darka



Proving that there's no substitute for experience when dealing with difficult conditions, Darka Trading and Services has just successfully completed an 800-kilometer delivery of a large crane from Port Sudan to the Bisha gold mine in neighboring Eritrea. This was the first such delivery of equipment from Port Sudan across the Sudan/Eritrea border.

The crane -- urgently required by the mining project -- weighed 82 tons. The 800-kilometer road ended in a 130-kilometer stretch of rough tarmac where bulldozers and loaders had to be used to grade and settle the surface.

The job was completed successfully by Darka's experienced staff in five days. www.gpln.net



Lutful hauls 2000 tons of power into port



utful Seaways Ltd. has just handled one of the biggest power plant projects in Bangladesh's power plant history at Chittagong port. The project was part of the extension program of the Sikhalbaha Electric Power Station in Chittagong.

The cargo was loaded from Huangpu, China and was discharged at Chittagong from the vessel MV Industrial Dawn, operated by New Orleans-based project carrier Intermarine LLC.

Lutful worked as shipping agents for Intermarine and also assist in the overall barge opera-

tion. Chittagong-based Lutful is also the Bangladesh cargo booking agents for Intermarine.

The project consisted of 44 packages of engine, crane, transformers, generators, auxiliary and containers and the total cargo weighed nearly 2000 metric tons.

Generators

The heaviest piece was the engine weighing 230 metric tons followed by the generators weighing 30 metric tons. Apart from the containers, the whole cargo was discharged into barges.

The operation was made more complex due to the restricted nature of barge operations at Chittagong port. Lutful was forced to discharge the engine, crane, transformers, generators, and auxiliary directly into barges.

5K completes hydro dam turbine shipment





K Logistics of Chambersburg, Pa., USA recently completed the US inland shipment of a heavy, over-dimensional hydro turbine system on behalf of Voith Siemens.

The turbine system was offloaded in Houston and trucked to Beverly, Washington for installation at the new hydro power generation station at the dam project. The pair of turbine shafts weighed in at 77,633 kilograms and measured 7.68 meters long by x 3.5 meters wide by x 3.14 meters high each. Special 19-axle heavy haul specialty trucks were utilized in the 2200-mile (3500-kilometer) journey. 5K Logistics is a GPLN member and partners with other GPLN members involving any US inbound or outbound projects. www.gpln.net

Hindustan finds solution to big kiln problem



Hindustan Cargo (HCL) recently had the opportunity to show its expertise in the field of tailor-made solutions for Sanghi Industries Limited, Ahmedabad for transportation of four units of their over-size kiln shells from Chennai to Sanghipuram, Kutch, Gujarat, about 2450 kilometers from Mundra Port. The maximum dimensions of the kiln were 14 meters by 6.7 meters by 6.7 meters, the heaviest weighing 78 metric tons. The other kiln were of similar dimensions but weighed less.

It was soon apparent that road transportation of the kiln shell with these dimensions was next to impossible. Hindustan Cargo Limited (HCL), took up this challenge and provided the client with a solution of sea-cum-road transportation. The kiln shells were loaded onto low bed heavy duty trailers and transported to Chennai Port. After completion of loading and obtaining the green signal from the surveyors the vessel sailed with these kiln shells to Mundra port, which is one of the nearest port to Sanghipuram site. Eventually, the kiln shells reached site after a period of 40 days. www.gpln.net

TIL delivers a Pearl to Qatar





rans International Sdn. Bhd., a new member of GPLN, recently completed the movement of the flare riser sections for the Shell Qatar Pearl gas-to-liquid (GTL) Project; the world's largest GTL project. Comprising 15,000 freight tons, these units were shipped in eight conventional shipments.


To date, Trans International Logistiks has successfully executed and moved 40,000 freight tons for this project from Malaysia to Qatar.

The highlights of the movement were the riser units which measured 23 meters long and 4.5 meters high and pre-fitted with insulated steam lines and utilitypiping.

The fabrication yard, located in the outskirts of Selangor, posed challenging especially in clearing overhead cables and structures.

The quick pace of the project required very fast deliveries of these sections where transportation exfactory to Port Klang needed to be executed within a few days of the vessel being nominated. The sensitivity of the surface of the riser units also required special handling techniques where metallic and abrasive equipment could not be used, so as to maintain scratch-free handling, transportation and loading of these units.

It was with a sense of pride that Trans International Proud was able to say that all deliveries were executed well within the required time frames with zero untoward incidents. www.gpln.net

Plain sailing for long load



 \P urope Cargo recently had to deal with a difficult project involving a de-ethanizer destined for the Namvaran petrochemical plant in Iran. Europe Cargo was acting on behalf of shippers, G&G Willebroek.

The de-ethanizer was booked as deck cargo, weighing 177.2 metric tons with dimensions of 55.33 meters long by 4.78 meters by 4.61 meters.

The multi-purpose heavy-lift project carrier MV Beluga Foundation, equipped with two 120 metric-ton gear (combinable up to 240 metric tons), arrived in Antwerp and crew started to prepare deck for three to four hours. The cargo was loaded during the day shift at the G&G Terminal on the barge Oleander and arrived in Antwerp same day.

The tallyman at the terminal gave a length of 60.36 meters instead of 55.33 meters which caused consequent lifting and deck stowage problems at the handling by the ship's gears. Gottwald crane and boat was already secured on deck before the loading operation of the deethanizer started.

To fix the problem and cut labor costs, Europe Cargo immediately organized a technical team to reduce the length.

Meanwhile the crew prepared ship's gear : two 80-ton wire grommets, two 60-ton wire grommets and one 120-metric ton shackle.

The main body was loaded over a two and a half hour period, followed by the spare parts. The cargo was secured with a second lashing and welding gang and operations were finished upon which the ship began its journey to the Iranian port of Bandar Imam Khomeini. www.gpln.net

HEB lifts for Sharjah project



tional Logistics performed has an integral role for the installation of power transformers for Sharjah Electric & Water Authority (SEWA) of the UAE, for which technical support was provided by the Siemens Group, Germany. HEB arranged offloading of two power generator units weighing 80 tons each

from the dedicated charter vessel at Hamriyah port, Sharjah along with accessories weighing around 80 tons. Ten lowbed trailers were deployed exclusively for the task and the entire offloading, directly from the chartered vessel to the installation site, was completed within 13 hours of operation. A 400-ton crane with 100-ton capacity slings was arranged for installation of the transformers from the waiting low buoy on to the fixing rail at the job site. www.gpln.net

Logistics Plus maintains high speed for Marathon





cargo ship the MV Noto III which reached the port of Mumbai, India after a 10-day voyage. The cargo was stored under deck and in a non-stackable condition as requested by the final customer, Marathon Electric India Pvt. Ltd.


From there, the 98 cubic-meter cargo was transported 1450 kilometers by trailer to Faridabad near Delhi, a trip which took 15 days to complete.

Bellville Rodair's Energy team which focuses on transportation requirements in the renewable energy sector was awarded a contract to move 102 blades by barge for a wind farm in France between August and October this year.

Transporting blades by road requires many permits when you are transiting through two or three countries and it is time consuming to obtain all these permits. Bell-ville shortened the distance needed to be transported by road by using the waterways where possible and although the transit time is slower by barge, it is still quicker overall as Bellville did not have to wait for permits for the barge transport and their client also gained in a reduction in the transport costs as well as using a "greener" method of transportation.
