No room to spare for Al Masar Al-Iraqi



l Masar Al-Iraqi Shipping, GPLN member in Iraq, recently handled a challenging concract to transport three specialized tanks each of capacity 200 cubic meters and 16 meters long, the challenge was to transport these tanks from port of Umm Qasr in southern Iraq up to North Rumaila about 120km north-west of Basra city center, passing low bridges, unpaved roads, not to mention the security risk in transporting this type of cargo for this distance.

Some of the bridges were less than 4 meters high whereas the tanks reached 4.5 meters off the ground, so the company had to find alternative ways to cross, losing time in the process.

The high wind was also a challenge as it was frequently blowing at 70km/hour not to mention the open space of the desert which made the vi-

sion very bad as well as the risk of the tanks falling from the sides.

The last challenge was to bring the tanks in to the main camp where the road was unpaved and sandy so that made the risk become very high in level, but with the help of our fantastic engineers who have very long experience in the logistic field, made this process easier than it looks like.

we had to move it up to a north eastern UK port, feeder it to Rotterdam where from we could load it on its intended ocean going vessel for Korea. On arrival to Rotterdam it had to be moved from one terminal to another on barge. Again, due to its height it was impossible to move within the terminal. TeamGlobal battles crowded Mumbai



eamGlobal's project dept based in Mumbai has handled a heavy lift movement to Illychevsk, Ukraine. This shipment was on FOT basis till loading of cargo on the vessel.

The challenging cargo was 13.3 meters long by 4.5 meters wide by 4.36 meters high and weighed 43 metric tons.

The main challenge in this job was to handle this cargo from Panvel to Mumbai Port and then to load onto the vessel, because of its unusual dimensions, which allowed the vehicle to move only for four hours in night & took two days to reach Mumbai Port from Panvel.

The new flyovers and overbridges in Mumbai city are proving to be major impediment in transport of heavy and over dimensional cargo from outside the city limits to Mumbai port which is situated in the heart of the city.

Another challenge was to load the cargo onto vessel was to use the proper balancing and lifting of cargo using the nylon belt. Finally the cargo was loaded onboard in the middle deck of the vessel, by using the vessel's two self gear cranes each with capacity of 40 tons. www.gpln.net

Fleet Line handles door-to-door job



leet Line Shipping, Dubai has recently completed a project shipment successfully to Basra, Iraq. It comprised three tanks, each measuring 17 meters long and 4 meters diameter and several GP and open-top containers.

It was a door-to-door shipment thus they picked up the cargo from the factory in Shar-

jah and transported to Jebel Ali port by lowbed trailers.



Mercure tackles tough terrain in Ethiopia



ercure International recently received a contract for transportation of two transformers with 60 metric ton weight each, from a vessel at Djibouti port a distance of 900 kilometers up to Ethiopia's first-ever wind farm located in Ashegoda, Ethiopia, and for subsequent positioning on foundations.

Equipment used included a combination of MAN 40440DFS truck with goose neck + 7-axle line Nicolas hydraulic trailer.

Neither the distance nor the weight of the pieces (60 metric tons per transformer) appeared as major obstacles to execute the movement of the cargo to the final destination.

Nevertheless, it was in fact a considerable challenge to overcome the rough terrain including high hills and mountains with altitude up to 2300 meters on the path of convoy plus inclement weather conditions.

Only a small part of the total distance being tar-

mac road, remainder is majorly paved, stony tracks forced Mercure staff to by-pass most of the critical passages. Assistance of an extra puller was required on steep hills.

Mother Nature made the operation even more difficult for Mercure staff. Floods, caused by continuous seasonal rains had damaged several bridges en-route forcing Mercure to by-pass these passages via dry river beds.

Despite the hardship from nature, and other obstacles Mercure managed to deliver the transformers at final destination in Ethiopia in time without any damage to the cargo, a testament to Mercure staff and their dedicated work to make this a success story.

Changing conditions like these are very common in Africa. Problems require solutions and the ability to produce them comes with experience and know-how which are resident at Mercure International. www.gpln.net

WWL introduces new services

allenius Wilhelmsen Logistics (WWL) thrives on constantly developing and improving its services, and has recently embarked on several new initiatives.

▶ New Chile Service - with the first sailing June 11 with Grand Race (voyage UX 166), WWL is expanding the west coast of South America to include the ports Antofagasta and San Antonio.

These ports come in addition to the current coverage of Guayaquil (Ecuador) and Callao (Peru).

► WWL has increased its frequency on its North America to Oceania trade to a total of four

Long haul for Lomer Point and AICL to Kazakhstan



omer Point Bridge in cooperation with Asia Imperial Logistics has completed the delivery of full set of power generator equipment from Hong Kong to Atyrau, Kazakhstan via Mariupol.

The power station facility is one of the most strategically important service facilities of Atyrau city and the above equipment had to be delivered to the destination point in Atyrau within the period strictly limited by city authorities.

The entire facility consisted of 43 over-sized units (3577 cubic meters, 656.7 tons) and 23 x 40-foot containers.

Small parts which contains electrical equipments and were not sea worthy were loaded into 23 x 40-foot containers had to be delivered by railway via China.

There were three pieces which weighed over 160 tones each and 40 pieces of oversized ones,

which were handled from Hong Kong to the delivery point with sea and river transport by the Black and Caspian Seas through the Ural-Caspian water channel to Atyrau river port with a vessel of Omsky class.

Another challenge was that the capacity of the river port of Atyrau was not explored enough before and the vessels of Omsky class previously seldom entered the port.

The above port served for middle-sized cargoes delivery mainly with derrick barges.

The above cargo had been delivered to the port of Mariupol by January and it was necessary to wait for the commencement of navigation period to get the opportunity to reach the Caspian Sea by river and then proceed to Atyrau.

The natural conditions including sturgeon spawing period and the quite shallow waters of Ural River taking into account the fact that the loaded vessel submerged for 1.7 meters proved to be extremely severe and created a great number of troubles for the crew. But the occurring problems were solved one by one owing to the powerful tow-boats and high-class navigation operations.

700-tons capacity crane was installed in the port of Atyrau for discharging the goods.

Finally, the cargo was delivered and successfully off-loaded and then transported from the port of Atyrau further to its delivery point. www.gpln.net

Almajdouie wins logistics deal for major Saudi projects

oosan Heavy Industries & Corporation has been awarded a turnkey contract for Rabigh-2 Power Plant Project, which is located in western region of Saudi Arabia, and has awarded the complete onshore freight forwarding contract to GPLN member Almajdouie Group.

Doosan will use its in-house freight forwarding company to handle door-to-door services for all project shipments, which are estimated at approximately 750,000 freight tons. There will be more than 300 heavy and oversized units, which will be shipped from global vendors to Rabigh, Saudi Arabia.

The freight forwarding contract awarded to Almajdouie Group involves handling local customs clearance, warehousing management and land transportation of the entire project shipments as well as installation of heavy units onto foundation by using various installation engineering methods.

Almajdouie Heavylift Transport & Engineering will provide safe feasibility study for receiving and land transportation of heavy and oversized units from Jeddah/ Yanbu seaport as well as jetty operation. Since this project has been



announced as a fast-track project completion time has been set at three years. Rabigh 2 Power plant will be one of the biggest projects in terms of project volume ever handled by Doosan Group in Saudi Arabia. www.gpln.net
